DD/70: Key list of former references

Note A list of accession DD/70 was made shortly after its reception in 1962 in which groups and bundles rather than individual items were numbered. In the present list each individual item has received a number. There were two main groups of loose papers, relating to the appointment of trustees, and to nos.14-18 The Broadway respectively. The groups were probably originally distinct and this has been respected. Pencilled headings on some of the papers, and on some which were previously not listed, indicate, however, that the bundles which were received were not precisely the original archive bundles. The loose, previously unlisted, papers have therefore been divided between the two groups on a subject basis.
