

1025. 1772 1 Oct. LETTER: Hugh Owen of Orielton to Poole. Gives instructions re the survey of his estates. Mr. Williams must survey the whole himself as he is afraid his assistant will make mistakes. He must indicate rights of common on the maps. His father is prepared to grant Mr. Nell permission to try for copper ore at Nantley and Tyninant, provided he compensates the tenants for any damage, they may not mine the ore, however, until a lease has been executed. Some years ago his father granted a lease to some people to try for ore at Gellifrydan, but they have never made any trials.
1026. 1772 24 Oct. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Richard Poole discussing estate business.
1027. 1772 14 Nov. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Richard Poole. Poole may keep the oil or tallow out of the fish which come ashore at Aberffraw for his own use. Mr. Hughes has been taking depositions from old people at Llangristiolus and seems likely to dispute the Owens claim to some quilletts there. He hopes the survey is progressing well. The men are to give instructions to all his tenants to take care of any trees and protect the young ones from cattle.
1028. 1772 1 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen of Landshipping to Poole. Gives Poole instructions re various tenants.

1029. 1772 15 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. Discusses a dispute between himself and Mr. Hughes over ownership of a quillet.
1030. 1772 20 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Poole giving Poole instructions re the estate. The tenant Hugh Roberts of Llangeinwen parish must be turned out. The quilllets must be let to good tenants who will build houses.
1031. 1772 26 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen from New Bond Street to Poole. Gives him instructions re leasing one of the farms, he would prefer a tenant to live on the farm rather than let it as a byehold.
1032. 1773 26 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. Discusses various estate matters. If the tenant, David Griffith, refuses to sign the lease he must be given notice to quit. He has decided to take proceedings against people who refuse to deliver up goods salvaged from wrecks to his agents.
1033. 1773 24 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. Gives him instructions re various tenants. Poole is to send Williams to number all the trees on the farms in Anglesey and Caernarvonshire and to see that all young growth is fenced in from cattle. All the tenants must be told to take particular care to protect the timber from their cattle.

1034. 1773 27 Apl. LETTER: H. Owen of New Bond Street to Poole. As soon as the survey is finished Poole must work out which of his holdings are capable of an advance in the rent. He approves of all the tenants, except those with leases, being given notices to quit. The tenants of the byeholds must be given notice too as some of their rents are capable of advancement, but Poole must also tell the tenants that the purpose of this notice to quit is not to evict them but to come to a settlement with them over the granting of leases for lives. He will come to North Wales early in the summer in suspense longer than necessary, especially in the case of tenants who are to erect buildings on the byeholds. His Caernarvonshire tenancies are let in May so the tenants cannot be given notice till November.
1035. 1773 28 Apl. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. If his tenants do not pay their arrears they must have notice to quit instead of being issued with new leases. The tenants who do not accept the terms of the new leases will be given notice to quit. Gives Poole instructions re various tenants.
1036. 1773 7 May LETTER: H. Owen from New Bond Street to Poole. The tenants are to be given notice to quit, they are to be told, however, that he does not intend to remove any of them from their farms but merely to come to an agreement with them over leases for lives. He is coming to North Wales soon to settle matters.

1037. 1773 23 June LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole. Discusses various estate business. He hopes the tenants who have taken the byeholds will build houses soon. He is not sure that he can secure for Poole the place he asked for as Lord North has received many applications for it and his interest is not strong in that quarter.
1038. 1773 17 July LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Richard Poole discussing estate business and policy for granting leases. He intends to visit Anglesey soon to settle matters.
1039. 1773 7 Aug. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole. Gives Poole various instructions re leases on the estate.
1040. 1773 19 Sept. MEMORANDUM from Col. Owen from Landshipping to R. Poole. Gives instructions re the survey he is having made of the Anglesey estates. He is having a small pocket-volume of maps made as well as a large set. Before the leases are handed over to the tenants, Poole must note down all the details about the lives in the lease. He must also copy the timber survey and ensure that no tenants cut down trees on their holdings. Gives Poole instructions concerning various tenants and applicants.

1041. 1773 11 Oct. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. Discusses the survey of his estate done by William Williams and other estate matters.
1042. 1773 13 Oct. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole re a lease.
1043. 1773 23 Oct. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Richard Poole. Agrees to Poole's lease of certain tenements at a low rent subject to an agreement to build a house there.
1044. 1773 13 Nov. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. Discusses various estate questions. Sir Nicholas Bayley has agreed to a division of lands held in moiety.
1045. 1773 2 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Poole. He instructs Poole to ignore a letter on behalf of another landowner's tenant who is to lose quilllets let to him by Sir H. Owen and adds that his lands are not let for the benefit of other people's tenants. Certain lands are only to be let on condition that the takers build houses. He also intends to make Mr. Hughes "pay very dear" for having fabricated a story of having Sir Williams's consent to a lease of Tyddyn Sadler. Gives him other instructions re the estate.

1046. 1773 7 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Poole. Gives him instructions on various estate questions. Poole must try to increase the rents of the smallholdings. He must also tell the tenants to be particularly careful of the timber on their farms.
1047. 1773 22 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. He has now made a final agreement with the land surveyor over the price of the survey. Gives Poole instructions re various tenants. Poole is told to be firm with them. Also gives instructions re the letting of Newborough Warren. He adds that he does not like excise-men as tenants as they are always moving and the houses get out of repair.
1048. 1773 23 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. Discusses the impudence of the Hughes family who are refusing to show the consent of Sir William to a lease of Tyddyn Sadler unless he asks it as a favour. He does not believe this consent was ever intended. Hughes tricked Sir William by giving a very poor account of Llanfaglan and Nantley farms.
1049. 1774 3 Feb. LETTER: H. Owen of Grovenor Street to Poole. He does not know any of the Merionethshire candidates and therefore will not interfere in the election. He thanks Poole and his father for the offer of their interest in that county.

1050. 1774 31 Mar. Letter: H. Owen to R. Poole. Gives Poole orders to include in some leases stipulations that the tenants are to erect houses at their own expense and gives other instructions re the granting of leases and the estate. Poole is to take a firm line with the tenants.
1051. 1774 22 Aug. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielson to Poole giving Poole various instructions with respect to the estate and urging Poole to be very firm with the tenants.
1052. 1774 9 Oct. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielson to R. Poole, Esq., Lord Bulkeley has informed him that he intends to stand as a candidate for Anglesey. All the interest on his and Sir William's estate must be used to support him. He believes the tenants will comply with his wishes. Asks for Poole's vote and interest in support of Lord Bulkeley. The election for Pembroke is approaching. He expects his kinsman Mr. H. Owen will be unanimously selected on his recommendation. No one has yet declared themselves as a candidate for the county so he expects no opposition to his own candidature there.

1053. 1774 18 Feb. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. If any tenants apply to others to intercede for them, Poole must take no notice. He has considered suffering a recovery on the estates in Anglesey which his father gave him. Asks Poole's advice on some legal points.
1054. 1775 20 Feb. LETTER: H. Owen to Richard Poole acknowledging receipt of money. He congratulates Poole on his marriage.
1055. 1775 13 Apl. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. Gives Poole instructions on various estate questions he had referred to him. Poole must forbid the Turnpike Committee to touch the Owen Estate at Tyddyn Du. If they try to cut across his lands without his consent there will be trouble for them. Poole must delay the action against Mr. Pugh of Merioneth for selling wreck goods until they have taken further advice.
1056. 1775 23 May LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole on various estate matters. Poole must force three tenants in arrears to pay their rents.
1057. 1775 19 June LETTER: H. Owen from Landshipping to Poole re various estate matters. He will take action if the tenants do not pay their arrears. Announces his appointment as Lieutenant of Pembroke-shire. He is also to be made High Admiral of North Wales.



1058. 1775 29 July LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Richard Poole. Discusses estate business. He has received a Patent appointing him as Vice Admiral for North Wales. He intends to appoint Poole as his deputy. Asks him for any suggestions for people to appoint as Water Bailiffs.
1059. 1765 16 Sept. LETTER: H. Owen from Fynore to R. Poole. Asks Poole to come to Orierton to render his accounts. Thanks Poole for his congratulations. The marriage took place that morning.
1060. 1775 LIST of trees blown down at Plas Newydd by the storm on October 19th, 1775.
1061. 1775 18 Nov. LETTER: Hugh Owen from Grovenor Street, London, to Poole. Asks Poole to look into the Turnpike Act to see what powers the trustees have over the purchase of land. Poole must get the land they want properly valued. He will not agree to their demands unless obliged to by the Act of Parliament. Discusses other estate matters. Mentions the proposed sale of timber from Plasnewydd and Nantley. He gives Poole a free hand on the lease of the Cellar and Bodfourrog farms but the tenants must agree to keep them in good repair or forfeit their leases. The farms have suffered badly in the past from bad tenants.

1062. 1775 18 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole. He leaves Poole to decide whether to agree to the sale of some of the Owen Estate lands as requested by the Caernarvonshire Turnpike Trust Committee, but he will not let them have it if it can be avoided, nor will Sir William give it to them free in case it encourages further encroachments on Sir William's estate.  
Discusses various leases. He agrees with Poole's conduct at the turnpike meeting as reported in a later letter. To have the road cutting between Wernbach and Bryn canon farms would certainly damage them. He intends to resist the trustees' requests.  
Discusses other matters.
1063. 1776 10 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen of Orierton to Poole. Discusses the question of some leases and instructs Poole to insert clauses exacting Heriots from the tenants. Announces the death of General Owen at Bath. Gives other directions re the estate.
1064. 1776 5 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. He approves of Poole's conduct with respect to the wrecks, and intends to look into the question further.

1065. 1776 16 Apl. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. He hopes Poole will do his best re Mr. Bennett Williams's hounds and that he can persuade some of the tenants to keep them. He has heard Lord Bulkeley is in Anglesey. He wishes that Lord Bulkeley would nominate Poole as his agent but does not feel it would be proper for he himself to write to Lord Bulkeley to press the matter. Instructs Poole re the estate of the late General Owen. The eldest son who inherits the estate is in India at present.
1066. 1777 12 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Richard Poole, Esq. Giving him instructions re the estate. One tenant in arrears is to be given notice to quit and a distraint made for the rent. He believes the tenement could be let at a much higher rent. In a postscript Lady Owen asks Poole to send her some flannel.
1067. 1777 27 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen from Poole on general estate business.
1068. 1777 6 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen to Poole. Asks Poole whether he should purchase certain lands from Capt. Owen who is disposing of his estates. Also asks Poole to enquire about a road from the church claimed by Mr. Meyrick. He intends to oppose his claims. He never received the promised tea chests from the East Indies from the French ship which were to be sent by Capt. Jones of Caernarvon, but wants to see them. Tells Poole to get in all the rent arrears.

1069. 1778 7 Feb. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. He hopes for news of the mine which John Jones and others imagine they have discovered near Llandwyn rocks. Discusses the legal proceedings for recovery of the King's rents. He has had many complaints about Mr. Meyrick's making a road through their farms. He refuses to agree to the plans because of complaints from his tenants.
1070. 1778 17 May LETTER: H. Owen of Orierton to Poole. He suggests that Poole make a distress on two of his tenants in arrears as an example to the other tenants to force them to pay their arrears. Asks Poole to send him some flannel and poplin by the next available ship.
1071. 1778 6 June LETTER: H. Owen of Orierton to Poole. Discusses estate business and collecting rent arrears; the receipt of £5 in lieu of acknowledged heriot on death of Elizabeth Owen of Llangwyfair parish. He mentions proposals for letting the old miner take part of the ore landed to be smelted on payment of part of proceeds of the sale. As soon as it is smelted they will be able to judge the prospects there.

1072. 1778 27 Oct. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Poole. He refuses permission to Mr. Meyrick to cut a new road through his land. He thinks the proposals would harm some of his holdings.  
Re William Williams and the colliers, he refuses to agree to their sinking shafts for coal and culm in the farms but they may dig in the marsh and rocks, etc. provided they pay him a one-third share at the pitsmouth of all the coal and culm landed. He refuses to allow his farm lands to be torn up before the rocks and marsh have been worked.
1073. 1778 24 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen of Orielton to Poole. Discusses the wrecks and various estate business. Asks Poole to negotiate with Nicholas Bayley re the lands held in common with him. Also discusses the question of an exchange with Mr. Meyrick. Poole must act to recover the mast that was taken to Bodorgan from the wreck.
1074. 1778 31 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Poole. Congratulates him on the birth of a son. He intends to take proceedings against people to establish his right to wreck goods. Asks Poole to select one person from each county against whom he can start proceedings. As Vice Admiral of North Wales he has rights over all wrecks taken up at sea. The Bishop only has a right to wrecks washed up on the shore under his Lordship. Asks Poole to take steps to recover from Mr. Meyrick the wreck taken to Bodorgan. Asks Poole to send some cranberries to Pembrokeshire and to collect in as much of the arrears as possible.

1075. 1779 14 Jan. LETTER: Hugh Owen, Esq. to Richard Poole. Congratulates Poole on the birth of his son. Apologises for giving Poole so much trouble over the cranberries.
1076. 1779 23 Feb. LETTER: H. Owen from Pembrokeshire to Richard Poole. Thanks him for the news re Hugh Williams's health and says "should he drop" he hopes H. Owen will succeed him. Lord Bulkeley has promised his support.
1077. 1779 6 July LETTER: H. Owen from London to Richard Poole. Thanks him for notification of the death of Mr. Williams. He has seen Lord North and requested the appointment of his "namesake" to the living. He believes Lord Bulkeley will support the application.
1078. 1779 8 July LETTER: H. Owen from London to Richard Poole, Beaumaris. His protegee has been appointed to the living at Aberffraw and Lord Bulkeley was particularly friendly towards him and had already written to Lord North in Hugh Owen's favour.

1079. 1779 12 July LETTER: H. Owen from Landshipping to O. A. Poole. Thanks him for informing him of the death of the Rector of Aberffraw. He has heard from Lord North that Mr. H. Owen will be the successor. Asks Poole to demand all arrears due from Mr. Charles Evans to Sir William and to take proceedings if necessary.  
Also asks Poole to get information re the 50 burgesses from old rentals, etc..
1080. 1779 7 Aug. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole. He hopes Lord Bulkeley is not alarmed at opposition for the county of Anglesey from Mr. Meyrick. Mr. Meyrick is protesting against the institution of Mr. H. Owen in the Aberffraw living. But he does not think the Bishop will listen to him. Discusses various estate business.
1081. 1779 17 Aug. LETTER: H. Owen from London to Richard Poole. A petition has been presented to the Bishop of Bangor against H. Owen being instituted in the living of Aberffraw.
1082. 1779 23 Nov. LETTER: H. Owen from Cleveland Row to O. A. Poole. Thanking him for the gift of puffins.

1083. 1779 30 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole. Discusses the wreck goods held in Caernarvon custom house and other estate business. Thanks Poole for the information concerning his tenants who were drowned. Heriots are now due to Sir William and himself because of this.
1084. 1780 4 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to R. A. Poole. He is pleased with Poole's handling of the wreck goods.
1085. 1780 11 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen to Poole. He approves of Poole's lease of Tynrallt in the parish of Trefdraeth to Hugh Thomas on condition that he pays off all the arrears of rent. Discusses other estate business.
1086. 1780 14 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from London to Richard Poole. Discusses the seizure of some packet boats and hopes it will lead to the coast being more securely guarded in future. Also mentions the 'warm work' in the House of Commons.
1087. 1786 28 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. Mr. Hughes [tenant of Nantley, etc.] has no right to cut trees. If he does so he will have broken the conditions of his lease. Mr. C. Owen has advised him to have an enquiry made into the matter before they decide what action to take. Discusses the question of wrecks and wreck goods. He leaves the question of letting Tyddyn Sadler to Poole's discretion.



1088. 1780 20 Apl. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Poole. He approves of the lease of Tyddyn Sadler, but asks why no heriot was included. Discusses another lease of No. 4 Llanbedr Newborough to Hugh Williams.
1089. 1780 19 May LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to R. Poole, Esq. Discusses various estate business. The tenant of Nantley has forfeited his lease by cutting down timber there. Asks Poole to dispatch some firearms by the first safe vessel to Pembrokeshire. Congratulates Poole on the latest increase in his family.
1090. 1780 15 July LETTER: H. Owen of Orielson to R. Poole. He promised to support Mr. Parry in the election for Caernarvonshire. However his own election matters necessitated his departure for Pembrokeshire. He is confident of his own success. Asks Poole to give all assistance possible to Mr. Parry and to inform the tenants that they are expected to vote for Mr. Parry.
1091. 1780 11 Sept. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielson to Poole. Sir Hugh Owen's election at Pembroke is coming on and he hopes for Poole's assistance. Asks Poole to retain any experienced election agents he knows of in his area.

1092. 1781 25 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen to Richard Poole thanking him for his gift of puffins and regretting that he could not visit them in Pembrokeshire, etc..
1093. 1781 25 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to R. Poole. He has received the goods by William Williams who is still confined at Orielton by the heavy snow. He hopes the tenants will be able to pay their rents as he wants the money.
1094. 1781 8 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from Pembrokeshire to R. Poole on general business. He is sending him a consignment of port. He expects Col. Owen in town soon.
1095. 1781 8 Mar. LETTER of Mr. Owen of Orielton to Poole authorising him to send the rents, etc. to his son Hugh Owen in London. With covering letter from Hugh Owen. He comments on his father's poor health.
1096. 1781 26 Apl. LETTER: H. Owen to Richard Poole. He has written to the Customs to claim a piece of white silk as his property as Vice Admiral. The matter is referred to the collector, Mr. Brisco. Endorsed with a postscript that Mr. Brisco reported that the silk was saved out of the La Catherine wrecked in Caernarvon bay on 6th February, 1776.

1097. 1781 1 May LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street, London, to Poole. Poole acted rightly in forbidding the enclosure affecting his lands in the parish of Trefdraeth. Asks Poole to get in as many rents as possible as he is in need of money.
1098. 1781 10 May NOTE: H. Owen to Poole re his father's death.
1099. 1781 16 June LETTER: Arthur Owen of Orielton to Poole. He is writing on behalf of Sir Hugh Owen who is incapacitated at present. Asks Poole to arrange for a recovery of his estates in North Wales to be suffered at the next assizes. Sir H. Owen has appointed a new agent in London. He invites Mrs. Poole to accompany Poole to Orielton. He adds in a postscript that he has found an old rental of 1784 which throws light on the Tyfry problem.
- 1100 1781 18 June LETTER: H. Owen to Poole re his recovery.
1101. 1781 26 July LETTER: Sir H. Owen to Poole on business re his recovery of estates in co. Anglesey.

1102. 1782 8 April LETTER: Hugh Owen of Orielton to Richard Poole. He intends to support Mr. Bayly at the forthcoming election in Anglesey. Asks Poole to do all he can to exert his interest in this case and hopes that Poole too will support him with his vote and interest. He adds that he himself was unanimously re-elected for Pembrokeshire and Mr. A. Owen for Pembroke.
1103. 1782 18 Nov. LETTER: H. Owen from Orielton to Richard Poole, Beaumaris. General business and social matters.
1104. 1782 13 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to Richard Poole. Discussing some wreck goods. He is surprised that the Beaumaris collector will not give up the silk as he had been ready to give his bond to export the silk.
1105. 1782 15 Dec. LETTER: Owen P. Meyrick of Bodorgan to R. Poole discussing the question of a road in the parish of Llancadwalader for which his tenants have been fined and asking for Sir Hugh Owen's co-operation in improving it.

1106. 1782 17 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen to Richard Poole, Beaumaris. Thanks him for the gift of oysters and puffins; discusses Sir Hugh Owen's health.
1107. 1782 21 Dec. LETTER: H. Owen of Grovenor Street to Richard Poole. Promises a fuller reply to his letter later as it is painful for him to write at present. Asks Poole to send him money. He is to send it in bank bills, cutting them in two and sending the halves by different posts for safety.
1108. 1782-84 OTHER CORRESPONDENCE of Sir Hugh Owen with Richard Poole; receipts for money paid by Richard Poole to Sir Hugh Owen and correspondence re business of Sir Hugh Owen.
1109. 1783 7 Jan. LETTER: H. Owen of London to Richard Poole. He has been delayed in town by death of his Uncle Owen of John's Court. Discusses other family business.
1110. 1783 19 Feb. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole. Discusses various business matters. Asks Poole to send a sloop with some timber which is urgently needed for the collieries at Landshipping.

1111. 1783 18 Mar. LETTER: H. Owen from London to Richard Poole re death of Mr. Owen Hughes. Lord Bulkeley is anxious to serve Poole and he may profit from Owen Hughes's death.
1112. 1783 22 Mar. LETTER: Sir H. Owen to Poole. He is glad Poole has persuaded Mr. Jones to come to Orierton as house steward. Asks what wages he expects. He would be expected to supervise the labourers as well as look after the usual business as house steward.
1113. 1783 20 May LETTER: H. Owen of Grovenor Street to Poole: as cattle and corn are fetching such high prices at present he hopes his tenants will pay their rents promptly.
1114. 1783 24 May LETTER: Lady Owen to Richard Poole. Thanks him for the Irish gloves and the cloth he sent her. Parliament is likely to sit very late and she does not know when to expect Sir Hugh's return. Gives news re her little son. He spends most of the day out of doors as she aims to make him hardy.
1115. 1783 28 June LETTER: H. Owen from London to Poole. Asks whether Poole has arranged for a house steward at Orierton as one is urgently needed there.

1116. 1783 10 July LETTER: Sir H. Owen from London to Poole making enquiries re a person Poole has recommended to him as house steward at Orierton.
1117. 1783 7 Aug. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to R. Poole re the appointment of his new house steward at Orierton.
1118. 1783 18 Aug. LETTER: H. Owen from Orierton to Poole discussing the problems of getting a suitable house steward. He was very glad Mr. Jones did not enter his service as he was a "very fickle, shuffling fellow". He hopes Poole will soon find him someone suitable. Asks Poole to convey his respects to the new bishop. The weather there is fine for the harvest. There is a short crop of hay but the corn looks good.
1119. 1783 22 Oct. LETTER: Mr. Goodman of (?Porthamel) to Richard Poole offering to sell Sir Hugh Owen a quillet in Frondeg called Llaingabriel.
1120. 1783 18 Nov. LETTER: Messrs. Dunn & Co. of London to Richard Poole discussing the question of Sir Hugh Owen's account. They ask him for an account of money he has sent to Sir H. Owen.

1121. 1783 25 Nov. LETTER: H. Owen from Grovenor Street to R. Poole re some wreck goods due to him as Vice Admiral of North Wales which the Commissioners of Customs have agreed to hand over.

During that time the churchwardens took on themselves the task of letting the glebe house and lands and the great and small tithes. Poole is to investigate the accounts of the churchwardens for this time and receive all sums of money owing to him.

His water bailiff, Bradley, has been more active than any other water bailiff in Sir Hugh Owen's cause. He also describes the plight of Edward Thomas who was forced through poverty to give up his farm. He describes his impoverished stock. His goods are to be sold to pay off his debts.

LETTER: William Owen of Pwllheli to Poole, with an account of wrecks and wreck goods in his district explaining the delay in giving details of goods of the schooner wrecked near Penychain. Some Liverpool men fearing the ship was the Juliana of Liverpool asked him to hold the goods till they made further enquiries about the cask marks. He has secured the goods as the cask marks are so clear and the goods in such good condition, that he is not sure if they would be right to sell them before the year and a day has expired.

Many similar events have taken place since the appointment of the vice admiral. Opinion is requested on what action can be taken.

CASE: In 1775 Hugh Owen of Orierton, co. Pembroke was appointed by the Crown as Vice Admiral, Commissary and Deputy in the office of the Vice Admiralty of North Wales and Pembroke-shire, with full rights of receiving the fees and profits of the office and of hearing maritime disputes, etc. and receiving wrecks.



In 1775, 19 October, a vessel was lost at Penrhos Veilieu, parish of Holyhead, co. Anglesey. Her crew perished. An agent for Sir H. Hugh Owen, Esq. was appointed Vice Admiral of North Wales and Pembroke-shire with all the fees and emoluments of that office. A vessel was lost at Penrhose Feilieu in the parish of Holyhead. Hugh Owen's agent marked a quantity of timbers from the wreck but these were later claimed by Thomas Williams of Llanidan under a grant from the Prince of Wales. Thomas Williams kept the profits of the wreck goods for his own use. In 1779 another boat was driven ashore near Towyn Trewin, co. Anglesey and was claimed by Sir H. Owen's agent. The Bishop of Bangor's seneschal later carried the goods away claiming them as the property of the Bishop of Bangor by virtue of his lordship.

In 1779 Mr. Meyrick of Bodorgan, co. Anglesey secured some timbers from a wreck claiming them under his lordship.

In 1780 the tide waiters found a mast floating in Beaumaris Bay and claimed it as the property of the Corporation of Beaumaris. Later some hogsheads of wine came ashore in Merionethshire. Richard Owen purchased one hogshead and carried it off in spite of the fact that he knew of Sir H. Owen's claim to it.

Many similar acts have occurred. People allege that Mr. Owen is not entitled to wrecks as no Courts of Admiralty have been held in the county. Opinion is asked on whether Mr. Owen can take legal action against these people. Counsel's opinion gives the necessary steps to be taken to set up a court of Admiralty. He must apply to the Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty for their sanction for such a court. The judge of this court would have jurisdiction over the wreck goods.

He and Ellis Hughes kept the country people from damaging the cargo and they did little damage to the rigging.
