INTRODUCTION

The papers of Garnet Joseph, first Viscount Wolseley, which are dealt with in this list, form part of the collections deposited in Hove Public Library by his daughter Frances, to form the nucleus of a Wolseley Room devoted to the study of horticulture and allied subjects. That part of the deposit which relates solely to the daughter's activities has been listed separately, and the present catalogue deals only with the 'Wolseley Autograph Collection' and other material relating to the Field-Marshal's career.

The history of these papers is very complicated, and is discussed in greater detail in Appendix I of this Report. They appear to derive from a much larger Wolseley archive, the full scope and extent of which has proved impossible to discover, which was deposited in the Royal United Service Institution by Wolseley's widow. The papers listed here are the more noteworthy as they appear to be the largest part of Wolseley's general correspondence to have survived.

Because of this difficulty of establishing the relationship of these surviving papers to the original Wolseley collection, it is possible to reconstitute the original arrangement only tentatively. The collection may conveniently be considered in four parts:

(a) Letters addressed to Lord Wolseley: These, the most important part of the collection, seem to have been split off from the bulk of his correspondence, possibly by the Field-Marshal himself, as an autograph collection, since many of the letters are marked 'Duplicate'. Some previous attempt at cataloguing them has been made, as some have been numbered in red ink, and others are inserted into paper frames provided by Frances Wolseley, with index cards attached. Selection has been somewhat haphazard, and it should be noted that there are very few letters in this selection from correspondents whose names begin with 'M'. Because the letters have been selected for their autograph interest, it was inevitable that the stature of the correspondent rather than the contents of each letter should have been taken as the basis of choice. Thus much social correspondence has been preserved; many invitations or acceptances have been kept merely as autograph specimens. But amongst these there are to be found papers of considerable interest to the political or military historian of the nineteenth century.

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(b) Letters addressed to Lady Wolseley: These are mainly of a social nature, and have been less thoroughly weeded than her husband's correspondence. The longest series of letters, those for example from T.J. Cobden-Sanderson, Edmund Gosse, Henry James and Lord Morley, give an indication of the wide range of her literary acquaintance.

(c) Collected Autographs: The collecting instinct was strong in all members of Wolseley's family, and one of his own recreations was the formation of a collection of autographs. Several letters in the main series refer to this pursuit, and two or three definite groups within the collection have a common origin, for example the American Civil War and French military autographs, and a series of letters addressed to William Sinclair, archdeacon of London. The identification of these different groups has been attempted by a cross-referencing system which records the writers and addressees of these collected letters.

(d) Apart from the main series of autograph letters, there are several other groups of papers at Hove which deal with Wolseley's career. Of these, the five loose-leaf binders containing Wolseley's letters, to his family, 1852-1887, are of particular interest. These are shelved and numbered with Frances Wolseley's own papers but have been listed here. A collection of Wolseley's military and administrative commissions, with ancillary correspondence, is also listed, as are papers relating to his ceremonial missions and grants of honours. A series of 33 scrapbooks contains material assembled by Lady Wolseley at her father's suggestion, including printed ephemera and other papers relating to the Field-Marshal's career. This gives a further demonstration of the collecting interests of the family, as well as providing a varied and interesting collection of Victoriana. A few other items concerning Wolseley, in particular a set of printed obituaries made up by the War Office for his family, and a copy of an interview with him printed in the Strand Magazine, are listed with Lady Wolseley's papers (items 205-207, etc.).

Some other Wolseley papers are to be found in other collections, and a list of these is given in Appendix II of this Report.

ARRANGEMENT OF THE LIST

The arrangement of this list follows the physical disposition of the papers in the Library. The autograph collection is kept in a filing cabinet in manilla folders, arranged alphabetically by correspondent. The letters in each folder have been rearranged chronologically, with undated letters at the end of each sequence, and numbered accordingly. Letters to Lord and Lady Wolseley have generally been separated, Lord Wolseley's correspondence preceding that of his wife. Envelopes have been numbered (a) following the digit of the relevant letter; they are not detailed in this list. The Library's order has been preserved in alphabetical arrangement, but, where necessary, cross-references have been added. Further cross-references have been inserted to relate the rest of the papers (section (d) above) to the autograph series, and to indicate some of the sources of the autograph collection. The list is therefore self-indexing.

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BIBLIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Wolseley himself published an autobiography, The Story of a Soldier's Life (1903), which covers his reminiscences up to the time of the Ashanti Campaign; Sir George Arthur edited The Letters of Lord and Lady Wolseley (1922), and with Sir Frederick Maurice was the author of the official Life of Lord Wolseley (1924). Since then, Wolseley's career has been dealt with incidentally in various works on late Victorian military history, for example in the Hon. G.R. St. Aubyn's The Royal George (1963) and Julian Symons' Buller's Campaign (1963). More specifically, his career has been dealt with in Professor Joseph H. Lehmann's All Sir Garnet (1964), in which a few letters from the Hove collection are quoted.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

The Commissioners are most indebted to the Corporation of Hove for their courtesy in making this material available for listing, and to the Borough Librarian, Mr. Jack Dove, F.L.A., F.R.C.O., A.R.C.M., and his staff, for their ready assistance. He has made no preparations for his lines of communication. Murray has done his best under difficulties. Clery has not allotted any troops to lines of communication. Just as Buller arrived, Joubert and Prinsloo the two Commanders in Chief came south of Colenso to attack Estcourt on Mooi River with a commando of 4,500, of which 3,400 were Free Staters. They came in Tentna pass and over the bridge at Hongers Poort while the remaining 900 Wakkerstrommen, the pride of the Transvaal Boers, captured an armoured train near Colenso, and joined the others at Ulundi on the slopes of Tubainklope Mountain. They then advanced on Estcourt but funked, crossed Bushmans River and laagered at Willow Grange. Hildyard who had reached Estcourt, attacked their laager at night. Very nearly an absolute success, there was an awful storm and he was a bit late. The Boers were awake. He lost 6 killed and 60 wounded. The Boer doctors admit 30 killed and 100 wounded. Joubert got in a funk, headed off from Colenso and bolted. His commando retreating in almost a rout via Weenen. Hildyard pushed on to Frere. Most of the enemy got through but he stopped a great deal of the loot and recovered many hundreds of cattle. The enemy had looted and destroyed every unoccupied farm they had passed and were all now believed to be back across the Tugela. B.'s dispositions:- Hildyard's Brigade, Barton's Brigade and Lyttleton's Brigade complete, and three Batteries R.F.A. about Frere, Estcourt & Mooi River and some 1,000, Light Horse and mounted Infantry of sorts. The Royals were there but they had

pink-eye on board and their horses were very weak. He also had 300 South African Horse under Byng who should do fair work. He expects 2 more Batteries R.F.A. on 1st and two Regts. (or the rest) of Hart's Brigade on the 3rd when he will be as strong as he can be. He can decide the problems before him when he sees the ground, the conditions are apparently these, the north bank of the Tugela commands the south (route). Country between Colenso and Ladysmith is very difficult affording every advantage to the Boers who have fortified it skilfully and concentrated every available soul they can get. Periera with Barberton Commando passed through Dundee the day before, about 26,000 against Buller's 16,000. Discusses routes which he is having reconnoitred via Hongers Poort or via Potgieters Drift. White will not help much but if B. can get to 8 miles of him he will get through without much trouble. Methuen is making a good advance on Kimberley. B. has no details of his fight at the Modder River but probably had to buy success dearly. All sorts of rumours about risings in Cradock and Cookhouse but he is getting mounted men now and is strong enough to make arrests. When he has got Ladysmith, he will have broken the back of his difficulties. This colony has behaved most awfully well. He made Methuen dress all his officers like the men and let them carry rifles instead of sword; this has cut the losses in officers. The men are in good heart and keen. Of the Generals Hildyard is doing well but Clery is disappointing.

9. 1900, June 25: Standerton: His reluctance to come here on 22nd as ordered by Roberts, as he wanted to settle the Vryheid and Piet Retief districts before uncovering his communication. His line is too weak. Criticises Roberts for pushing on to Pretoria and not using available troops for cleaning up the area behind him Criticises Rundle for not pushing on to Harrismith and finishing the war in the Orange River Colony. He had found some wounded who had been taken prisoner in a disaster he had never heard of and did not prevent correspondents from mentioning the fact. Muddle with the press censor at Cape Town but it never occurred to him to conceal the loss of some 700 men. Odger Colville was holding Lindley in some strength and was to move 500 Irish and Duke of Cambridge's Yeomanry was to succeed him. Odger moved off in the morning and the Yeomanry came up in the afternoon. The British Flag was still flying but they were received with a volley and retired to a Kopje and held this for 3 days. Lord Longford their Commander was very severely wounded in 4 places and as they had many wounded, they surrendered. The badly wounded were left at Reitz, but 460 came through line with 13th including Lord Leitrim, Lord Ennismore and Victor Gibson. The other lot were about 170; details of the Highland Brigade in Heilbron which is short of water and ammunition. They were escorting a convoy of 60 wagons commanded by a Militia Captain Campbell. They had no mounted men only as the sergeant said, the horse that carried the Doctor's panniers. They halted at some drift and half way across it, received a message from De Wet that they were surrounded, and as the Sergeant said, the Captain he surrendered. Another lot of 500-600, a Battalion of Derbyshire Militia, were also taken prisoner somewhere else at the time but have not been taken north yet. He hopes to intercept them. He has Boers all around him. Patrols meet them on every road about 4 miles out and he has only 7 days' provisions, but hoping to get a train through. Roberts telegraphed him to march to Balmoral, ninety miles away but does not mention supplies. He wants the Strathcona Horse sent to him via Heildelberg, but Ginglingstadt halfway is known to be held in strength and Buller doesn't believe Roberts has occupied Heidelberg yet. If he loses the Strathcona Horse Buller will only be left with 1,100 mounted men, too few to fight with in open country off a railway line. Doing all he could to compress it, on his move up, his train was 7 miles long! Cold. 10 to 15 degrees.

SCRAPBOOKS

The collections detailed below were assembled by Frances Garnet Wolseley at her father's suggestion. Each volume is introduced by an explanatory note, e.g. 'It was always his idea that all advertisements, cards or topical allusions should be preserved, and that they would be of great interest in future times.' 'It was by his wish that this collection was made, as he always thought that later on in 50 or more years time such pictures, even if they were only advertisements, would prove of interest'.

Volumes 1 to 25 contain some material of military interest or relating to Wolseley's official career, and material deriving from the family's social life, such as menu cards and invitations (see, for example, vols. 7, 19 and 25).

The main interest of this series of scrapbooks, however, lies as much in the light which it throws on the social history (in the broadest sense) of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, as in its specifically Wolseley content.

The volumes are listed individually below, but no attempt has been made to list their content in detail. Instead, examples are given under certain subject headings of the various types of material to be found in the books. APPENDIX I

The history of this collection is very complicated, particularly as it is involved in the story of the unhappy relationship of the dowager Lady Wolseley and her daughter, which resulted in the mother's endeavour to leave all the heirlooms in her possession outside the family, for example by giving a collection of plate to the Victoria and Albert Museum. Lord Wolseley's papers were divided, but with a few minor exceptions found their way into the same collection.

Lady Wolseley entrusted the correspondence of her husband and herself to Sir George Arthur, stipulating that the letters should be published within three or four years of her death. Sir George edited a selection of these in The Letters of Lord and Lady Wolseley, 1870-1911 (Heinemann, 1922). Sir Frederick Maurice was similarly entrusted with Lord Wolseley's official papers and such correspondence as related to his public life. Following the publication of Arthur and Maurice's Life of Lord Wolseley (Heinemann, 1924), both collections found their way into the Royal United Service Institution.

The efforts of Frances, Viscountess Wolseley, to secure access to, or possession of, her father's papers are fully documented in her own correspondence at Hove. The letters of her parents were loaned to her by Sir George Arthur for transcription, and Lady Wolseley's solicitor subsequently arranged with him that they should be deposited in the R.U.S.I. under seal for a fixed number of years. This restriction has now expired, and the series of letters of Lord and Lady Wolseley is now available to students on application to the Secretary of the Institution. It should be noted that Sir George Arthur's edition published only a fraction of the material, and that his editorial methods left much to be desired, as the text has been liberally altered and extensive deletions made.

As far as Lord Wolseley's official papers and correspondence are concerned, it seems that these went to the Institution through the then Secretary, Sir Arthur Leatham, who acquired them in a personal capacity and then made them over to the R.U.S.I. During 1928 and 1929 Lady Wolseley received several requests from biographers seeking access to their subjects' correspondence with her father, notably from Mr. Philip Gosse on behalf of the Hon. Evan Charteris, who was preparing a Life of Sir Edmund Gosse. Lady Wolseley subsequently wrote to the R.U.S.I. asking about her father's papers, and the ensuing correspondence [Viscountess Wolseley's papers, file 155] gives some indication of the nature of the whole deposit. The then Curator, Major E.L. Hughes, described the ten boxes of papers he had discovered while seeking the Gosse letters. Three of these contained material for Arthur and Maurice's Life; a fourth was a confidential letter box; a fifth, 'war diaries', is apparently now P.R.O., W.O. 147; the sixth consisted of an autograph collection; box 7 held material for the last two [unpublished] volumes of Wolseley's autobiography, and box 8 contained material for the unpublished volumes of his Life of Marlborough; the two final boxes held some of Wolseley's published literary manuscripts.

It was in the sixth box that Hughes found the Gosse letters which originated the enquiry. The papers were clearly arranged alphabetically as an autograph collection. Following further enquiries from Lady Wolseley, Sir Arthur Leatham and Major Hughes suggested that she might like to have the autographs in her own care, and early in July 1929 the Council of the R.U.S.I. approved the transfer. Thus the autograph collection has come to its present home, having been transferred to Hove with the rest of Lady Wolseley's papers, mainly during her lifetime.

As far as the rest of Wolseley's papers is concerned, enquiries made of the Hon. David Erskine at the Institution have revealed that in 1946 or 1947 the Wolseley papers then held by the R.U.S.I. were transferred to the War Office, and that those boxes which the Curator described in the correspondence of 1929 are now empty of Wolseley

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material and have long been put to other uses. A further search at the War Office Library, however, has revealed that the only volumes there are some 50 volumes of printed official reports and memoranda, which are unrelated to the biographical material and literary manuscripts described above. In view of the information we have received from the R.U.S.I., we have treated this collection as the largest constituent of Wolseley's general correspondence to survive.

APPENDIX II

Other deposits of Wolseley papers include:

Royal United Service Institution: The correspondence of Lord and Lady Wolseley, ca.4,000 items [cf. Lehmann, All Sir Garnet, p.9]. The trophies, medals and other relics of Wolseley which were presented to the Institution by his widow to make a Wolseley Room (opened 1920), have recently been transferred to the National Army Museum, ~~Sendhurst~~ ^{Royal Hospital Road SW3}.

Public Record Office, class W.O./147: 13 volumes, each a campaign journal, including MS 'Narrative of the War in China' and journals of the 1873 Ashanti campaign, Natal, Cyprus, Zulu War, etc. The last two volumes contain telegrams sent back and forth, and printed as Command Papers, concerning the relief of Gordon. [Transferred from War Office, 1964; formerly (1939) at R.U.S.I.]. N&A 28823

War Office Library, class W.: 50 volumes of printed official reports and memoranda, bound up mainly by subject for Wolseley's own use. These cover the years ca.1874-1890, and have many annotations in his hand. There are several manuscript official reports and a few letters which contain military intelligence of a formal nature.

British Museum, Add. MS.39809, fo. 65: Letter from Wolseley to his wife about Sir Herbert Stewart's expedition to Metemneh, 20 Jan. 1885 (cf. Arthur, Letters, p.158); presented by Lady Wolseley, 1918. Add. MS. 41324: Letter Book of Sir Garnet Wolseley: copies of his semi-official correspondence as High Commissioner and Commander-in-Chief, Cyprus, 2 Aug. 1878-11 May 1879 bought at Sotheby's, 1926.

Other Collections: a few additional pieces, presumably relating to Wolseley's Irish command, are to be found in the National Library of Ireland, Dublin, and isolated items which obviously derive from the Wolseley archive are located elsewhere. For example a letter from Gladstone to Wolseley, of 15 Sep. 1882, offering him a barony, is in Wigan Public Library.

The Commissioners would of course be grateful for any information concerning unrecorded Wolseley papers.

King Koffee will not come to terms, if he is defeated his kingdom will be wiped out. W. wants to give Ashantees thrashing on their territory, then come to terms with King Koffee, forcing a large indemnity which will preclude further war. Government may give up all establishments on this coast. Our position anomalous, an English judge and laws, but slavery prevalent, tolerated by British officials. The country should be separated from England. A Consul would be sufficient. Sickness and conditions make it difficult to get the right officials - many of them corrupt. Many abuses make any future governor's task difficult. Wolseley will return to England after military operations are over, D.V. by April 1st next. He wants to be made A.G. in India. Transport problems make his present task difficult. Tell Gen. Johnson he has found the book he needed. To Goldwin Smith. Thanks him for his letter. Cannot understand how General Middleton allowed himself to be mixed up in fur looting, thus giving excuse for an attack on the powers that be. Copy.

1890, Sept. 6: Pyt House, Tisbury, Wiltshire. To Goldwin Smith.

In harmony in their views on England's state; the motto of the country being cant and cowardice. Would welcome anarchy in the place of rule of an ignorant, vain and foolish mob, such rule must ultimately destroy the Empire. Deploras Middleton's fate, destroyed by party politics. Copy.

1894, Sept. 5: At sea, near Elba. To Goldwin Smith.

Acknowledges letter of July 8; hopes to be in London by the 8th instant. Has spent holiday visiting old haunts in the Crimea, and reminisces about the hardships and sufferings experienced by the men who fought there. Praises the courage of the common soldier who was England's salvation. Copy.

1902, Feb. 17: Farm House, Glynde near Lewes. To Goldwin Smith. -

Knows Thackeray's Esmonde well; Thackeray at one time intended writing a biography of Marlborough, and Wolseley hopes soon to return to his own work on Marlborough's life. Presents his kindest remembrances to Mrs. Smith. Copy.

1903, Dec. 23: Farm House, Glynde, Lewes. To Goldwin Smith.

Is afraid that the spirit of the Empire which is breathed throughout his book will not meet with Smith's approbation; has long thought that if it were possible for England and the United States to act together, all future wars would be stopped, resulting in a great economy to every great power. Mentions pensions still being paid by the United States in connection with the Civil War, both to the Americans and Irish in Ireland for the services of relations in that war. Copy.

1904, Jan. 28: Farm House, Glynde, Lewes. To Goldwin Smith.

Believes that deep down the inhabitants of the British Colonies have a love and reverence for the parent kingdom. Without love of country or national aspirations life would not be worth living; and national peculiarities and character bear upon the fate of armies. Means to return to writing about Marlborough as soon as he has finished his memoirs. Copy.

1904, Mar. 8: Farm House, Glynde, near Lewes. To Goldwin Smith.

Does not agree with his theories about war; since unoffending animals are slaughtered daily for foodstuff he cannot regard the deaths of fighting men in battle with the abhorrence that Smith does. Decries Russia as a monstrous and barbarous power and demands war to break Russia's power for all time. Copy.

1904, June 11: S.Y. "Iolaire", at sea, running for Holyhead Harbour.

To Goldwin Smith. Always pleased to receive his letter even though they view England's great national questions from different standpoints. Has no ambitions for humanity outside the English speaking race; and universal peace can never be brought about until the English speaking tribes decide that war must cease. If Russia were ruled by wise men she would make peace at once, but to continue the war is the act of men who either do not know or ignore the simplest problems of war. Copy.

1904, Aug. 16: Farm House, Glynde near Lewes. To Goldwin Smith.

Thanks him for his letter about Lord Dundonald's departure from Canada; is sorry that the manner in which Canadian ministers handled militia affairs should have induced Dundonald to express an opinion publicly. Wolseley believes him to have acted wrongly, but from the right motivation, love of Canada and the Empire; and with one object in view, the efficiency of the Canadian Military forces. Has not heard from Dundonald since his return from Canada. Copy.

INTRODUCTION

The following list describes those papers of Field Marshal Lord Wolseley which were formerly in the Royal United Service Institution. The papers were presented to Hove Corporation by the R.U.S.I. in 1968 and transferred to the Commission where they were arranged and listed by R.A. Storey and Mrs. B. Weeden prior to deposit in Hove in 1970.

The papers have been described in the Report of the Secretary to the Commissioners 1968-1969, and in an article by Mrs. Weeden in the Report of the Secretary 1969-1970. Their military interest principally lies in the Cyprus and Zululand letter-books and notes for Story of a Soldier's Life. The greater part of the papers, however, consists of literary material, mainly in connection with Wolseley's projected 4-volume Life of Marlborough, of which 2 volumes only were published. The Marlborough papers include correspondence with historians, librarians, archivists and owners of mss., as well as material for the unpublished volumes. (Only fragments of a possibly continuous typescript of this unpublished material were found amongst the large quantities of notes and drafts, many on small fragments of paper pinned together, and it seems very unlikely that any continuous sense could be made of the surviving papers.)

The other major group of mss. consists of the originals of the correspondence between Wolseley and his wife, some of which was edited by Sir George Arthur and published as The Letters of Lord and Lady Wolseley, 1922. These letters have been individually numbered, but not described in detail in the following list, with the exception of enclosures. With the other exception of Wolseley's own notes, drafts and extracts, especially for his Life of Marlborough, all items in this deposit have been listed in detail (although the description of the printed books and pamphlets, e.g. W/Pr., is not a full bibliographical one).

The Commissioners' thanks are due both to the Royal United Service Institution, and especially to the Hon. David Erskine, formerly Research Assistant, and to the Corporation of Hove, and especially to the Borough Librarian, Mr. Jack Dove, F.L.A., F.R.C.O., A.R.C.M., for the opportunity to complete the work on Wolseley's papers, begun with the list of the autograph collection and other material at Hove issued in 1965.
