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Introduction

The original endowment of the College included a farm and rent of 30^l which Sir William Phelip paid for the custody of the alien priories of Creeting St. Mary in Suffolk and Everdon in Northamptonshire, which he held on a ten year lease from Michaelmas 1437; with the reversion of the property. The grant was confirmed by Parliament and, in 1462, by Edward IV.

The priory of Creeting St. Mary, a cell of the Norman abbey of St. Mary of Bernay, does not appear ever to have been conventual. A few court rolls are the only documents which survive at Eton of the period before the College ownership. The earliest is dated 1399, at which time the lands were already in the hands of the crown and administered by its custodian. A change in the proprietorship of the manor takes place, as is so often the case, without any notice of the fact appearing in the court rolls. The name of the lord does not appear in the heading. It is only from an entry in the middle of the roll of 5 April 1434 (146) that it could be deduced that the lord was then, in fact, a lady. Domina concessit et ad firmam dimisit - the lady granted and let to farm to John Lynge, rector of the church of Cretynge St. Mary, seven acres of arable. This lady was Joan, widow of Henry IV, whose dower included so many of the alien priories later to be enjoyed by the College.

^Again, it is only from internal evidence, that the lordship of the Provost shows itself. On a later membrane of the same roll (146 m.15), at a court held on 31 May 1452, there is a presentment to the effect that Agnes, the widow of Robert Crane, held certain tenements by "sokenfee" and ought to pay the King 17^½^d for the same, but the rent falls to the Provost by reason of the liberties and franchises of the Royal College of the Blessed Mary of Eton.

The privileges of the College are again referred to at the court of 2 January 1459 (146 m.21). One John Seford, late of Little Stonham, yeoman, had broken into the house of John Lynge, clerk, (the same Lynge, presumably, the rector), arrested

him

him and taken him off to Ipswich gaol, where he had delivered him into the custody of William Foster. The latter, by colour of his office of warden, took 3s:2d from Lyngge and put him among the men indicted for felony. Three days later John Andrew, a Justice of the Peace, directed a writ of supersedeas to the Sheriff of Suffolk and other the King's ministers on behalf of the said Lyngge. William Foster, the warden of the prison, received this writ, but disregarded it and detained Lyngge in prison contrary to the liberties, privileges and franchises of the College. William Wyndesor, another tenant of the College at Creeting, was similarly arrested and imprisoned in disregard of the said privileges. What the offences of Lyngge and Wyndesor were is not stated. Nor does it appear what, if anything, was done in the matter. There are no Assize or Gaol Delivery Rolls of the period to throw any light on the case. But it may be supposed that the College took some action in defence of its rights, for the steward's marginal note against these entries in the roll is consulendum cum concilio. The lords of the manor were certainly apprised of the business.

The liberties of the College at Creeting must again have been threatened in 1627 (93), but it is not apparent what incident or incidents led to that threatening asseveration of rights.

Among interesting entries on the Court Rolls are the following. At a court on 13 June 1424 (146 m.2) John Denny was fined no less than 20s for taking "heyronnsewys", that is, young herons, within the lord's wood without leave. In 1443 (146 m.8) the office of the collector of rents for the year was assigned not to a person by name but to (the occupant of) a particular house, eligunt tenementum Fuldeweyes ad faciendum et gerendum officium collectoris reddituum hoc anno.

On 13 September 1619 (153 m.7) it was presented that John Fardinge had been drowned in the mill stream and the boat he was in was the cause of his death, quaedam cymba in qua prefatus

Johannes

Johannes tunc fuit movebat ad ejus mortem. Therefore the boat was forfeited to the lord as a deadand. It was valued at 3s:4d.

Many of the Creeting courts are to be found recorded in court books which include other East Anglian manors of the College. See, for these, Eton College Records vol.XXIX, Blakenham, where there are references to Creeting courts from 1598 to 1935, and numerous other references to Creeting.

Among the lessees of the manor of Creeting was John Hammond, a former headmaster and a protégé of queen Elizabeth (49-51), who resigned his post at Eton to devote himself to medicine. He became physician to James I and to Henry Prince of Wales, a copy of whose post-mortem examination among the State Papers (S.P.14/71 no.29) bears amongst other signatures (a copy of) that of Hammond. In Hammond's lease of Creeting manor he is described as of Chertsey, doctor of physic, and it was there that his youngest son, Henry, the famous divine, was born in 1605.

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Introduction

The deeds catalogued in this volume relate almost entirely to lands in Buckinghamshire, in Burnham, Boveney, Dorney, Cippenham, Datchet, Chalvey, Eton and Stoke Poges. They extend from the thirteenth to the beginning of the sixteenth century and include some thirty deeds of the reigns of Henry III and Edward I. Perhaps the oldest are nos. 1 and 205, to be assigned to the second quarter of the thirteenth century.

None of these properties appears to have been included in a royal grant. They were acquired by purchase or local benefaction. The grant of Thomas Smyth alias Buttler in 1528 (83) presumably accounts for all the lands in Burnham, Boveney, Dorney and Chalvey; except Lewin's lands in Cippenham, which were bequeathed by Thomas Lewin, alderman of London, in the reign of Mary.¹ The lands in Datchet, acquired first (184) by Richard Hopton, a fellow and former headmaster, and later by Provost Bost, three of the fellows and others (191), were granted away by the latter in 1501 (193).

Here may be read the manner in which the solemn anniversary of the death of Thomas Smyth alias Buttler was to be celebrated by the College in return for his benefaction (85).² It appears in an indenture, dated 9 July 1528, between provost Lupton and Thomas Smyth. This document bears the seal normally used by the latter.

From its counterpart, a full transcript appeared in 1855 in Notes and Queries,³ where it was stated that the original document, bearing the College seal, had formerly been in the possession of Thomas Martin, the well-known antiquary. How did he come by it, one wonders?
