the priories and possessions aforesaid, both those granted
for life and those let to farm for a term of years. Word
for word copies of a great part of them are kept by
William Tresham.

Examination must be made in the Exchequer of the
resumptions of all the priories and possessions aforesaid
in the time of Kings Edward I, II and III and Richard II,
and word for word copies made of the same so that the
College may have full knowledge of all the lands, rents
etc., and it will be seen if there is any unjust
concealment.

By the advice of Tresham a form of lease of the
premises must be made, sufficient and effectual in law.
And they are to be demised for their greater value so
that the King will pardon the farmers of the same all
tenths and fifteenths, taxations and tallages both from
clergy and laity, and will grant all possible other
liberties.

As soon as the revenues have been paid for the
said whole year, all sheriffs must be exonerated by a
writ to the Exchequer. And then at once as soon as may
be provision of the leases is to be made. And it is to
be seen from whom the farms for this year and for further
years are to be received.

This document can probably be dated in the middle 1460's. It is presumably earlier than the Patent of 17 July 1467 by which the College recovered two of the properties here mentioned as being lost to it, namely the priory of Brimpsfield and the watermill at Goring.

John Pilkington and John Fogge were two close adherents of Edward IV. The former became an esquire of the body on 17 July 1461 and was granted the hospice with 4 shops outside Aldersgate on 13 August 1461.¹ John Fogge was Treasurer of the Household. He does not seem actually to have held the pension of the Prior of Lewes or the manors of Preston and Hoo, for these were granted, inter alia, on 22 February 1462 in frankalmoin to Thomas Wylmote, vicar of Ashford, Kent,² a grant that was renewed on 18 November 1467.³ But he was interested in the same, for the purpose of the grant was that Wylmote should find two chaplains and two secular clerks to celebrate divine service in the church (of Ashford) for the good estate of the King, his kinsman George, bishop of Exeter, John Fogge, Knight, and Alice, his wife, and Thomas Colt, while alive, and for their souls after death, and for others killed in battle of Northampton, St. Alban's and Shirburn.

Suffolk, with all their appurtenances, except the advowsons of the churches and woods and underwoods and perquisites of courts, fines, heriots, reliefs, waifs and strays and all other escheats and forfeitures. From Michaelmas 1535 for 21 years. Rent 38*l*: 2*s*. The lessee to maintain the buildings, ponds, hedges, ditches, etc., but to have timber for the same from the manors by assignation of the lessors. The lessee to pay all rents and services due upon the premises to the King or any other lords, and the expenses of the College steward coming to hold courts there twice a year. The lessee to collect all the perquisites of courts and make an account of them to the College. If the rent is in arrears, in whole or in part, by three months, the lessors may re-enter the premises and expel the lessee.

The lessee and Hugh Danyell, of Asheton, George Danyell, of the same, and Richard Fitzwater, gentleman, and Robert Stokes, of Eton, co. Bucks, and John Veir, of Blakenham, yeoman, have bound themselves, by a bond of this date, in 100*l* for the observance of this indenture.

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Introduction

By the consolidation charter of 5 March 1446, which embodied the series of grants made to the College with the authority of the Parliament which met at Westminster on 25 February 1445, the College received omnia terras, tenementa, redditus, servicia et possessiones cum pertinenciis in Middilton in eodem comitatu (Wiltes'), dudum parcella et pertinencia prioratui de Brynnesfeld in comitatu Glouc' alienigene. The alien priory of Brimpsfield in Gloucestershire had been a cell to the abbey of Pontenay. The lands granted to the College were situated at Middleton in Norton Bavant in Wiltshire. The value to farm, which appears in the Valor Ecclesiasticus as 6l: 13s: 4d, became stabilised in the College leases at 4l: 8s: 10d with 2 quarters of wheat and 6 quarters 2 bushels of malt. This had been augmented by the middle of the eighteenth century by ten fat wether sheep.

Other records concerning this property have been catalogued in Eton College Records vol. 43, where, at no. 144, there is a reference to a plan or "eye draught" of the lands dated 1770, and in vol. 49 where there are various references.

The correspondence here described, much of it relating to the passage of the railway over College lands, does something to bring to life a character with whose name anybody studying the Eton records of the middle of the last century will become familiar, Thomas Batcheldor. Batcheldor, who died on 24 July 1866 at the age of seventy, had been the College Registrar for a generation. Simultaneously he had been Chapter Clerk to the Dean and Canons of Windsor and in this capacity had had quarters in the Castle, from which many of his letters are addressed. A fact which emerges from this correspondence is that the Registrar, like Mr Bayly, the tenant of Middleton Brimfield, was a keen fisherman. Whatever their differences may have been on business matters, their discussions would end amicably with talk about mayflies or

minnow spinning. It was no doubt as a fisherman that Batchelder had leased from the College the island of Blackpots in the Thames by Eton. The fact that in the very year, 1848, that the railway was being laid across the tenant's land at Middleton, the Registrar had to agree to the Windsor, Staines and South Western Railway passing across the island and fishery of Blackpots,¹ must have been a bond of sympathy between Bayly and Batchelder.

The latter's experience in this matter must have been particularly galling, for a map of 1846 shows that the first plan for the South Western Railway's approach to Windsor did not involve the crossing of Blackpots. A bridge was to take the line just beyond the upper end of "Batchelder's Eyott", the island immediately above Blackpots Eyott, onto the Romney islands for their length, and so over into Windsor. The map shows a fishing net drawn between Blackpots and Batchelder's Eyott at the very point where the railway bridge now bestrides them.

By what grant or purchase the portion of tythe called Bryan's acre, to be gathered from the fields of Elcomb in Wroughton, co. Wilts, came to the College, has not yet been ascertained. The Valor Ecclesiasticus (of 1535) shows the College as then holding it:-²

"Elcombe. Val' in firma cujusdam porcionis ibidem per annum 10s"
The 10s rent (90) after the statute of 18 Elizabeth c.6 became at first, in 1578,³ 7s: 6d and 4 bushels of malt, but was stabilised by 1603 (92) as 6s: 8d and 2½ bushels of wheat and 2 bushels of malt. The lands comprised 82a: 0r: 16p at this time; by 1772 they consisted of 82a: 2r.⁴ A few records relating to this property are described in Eton College Records vols. 47 and 49.

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Introduction

I n t r o d u c t i o n

Most of the maps and plans among the muniments of the College had been detached from the rest of the records of the estates to which they refer and were kept in drawers in the office of the Clerk to the Provost and Fellows. They have now been arranged and numbered, and are here catalogued. A few items, however, were found among the records and they appear in my catalogues. All these have been entered at the appropriate place in the present catalogue, but not numbered.

In addition to estate maps, there are a good many architectural drawings, principally relating to the College buildings at Eton.

The oldest map happens to be no. 1, a large coloured plan on parchment of the manor of Blakenham, that can be dated from internal evidence in the last decade of the sixteenth century. The annotations upon it contain a wealth of information. Another striking early plan, probably of the reign of James I, depicts in the naïf manner of the time, the warren at Cottisford known as Cuckolds Burrowe, showing in the brightest colours the features of the landscape including some rabbits.

The coming of railways was an occasion to swell the number of maps and plans among the College records, not only in respect of the lines that were built so threateningly near to the College, to approach Windsor from two sides, but also of those that passed through such outlying estates as Hampstead, Norton Bavant, Steeple Langford or Weedon Beck. The fear inspired in the Provost and College^{by} the dangerous vicinity of the Great Western Railway to the school is reflected in a declaration obtained from the Company "that such regulations and number of police as the Provost and

Head Master shall deem necessary ----- for the safety of the scholars and discipline of the school shall at all times be observed and kept on the said line". And no station should be made without their consent between Slough and Windsor (no. 411).

The development of the Chalcots estate at Hampstead and Hendon in the eighteen forties, fifties and sixties, was another occasion for map-making. The speculator who took the lion's share of building leases on the College property was Samuel Cuming. The style of house to be built was normally drawn on the lease. The leases are very numerous and no attempt has been made to catalogue these drawings.

The plans of Milton's father's house in the White Bear in Bread Street, made when the poet was a boy of eight or thereabouts, are presumably the main treasure among the maps and plans at Eton. They have been reproduced in the London Topographical Record vol. XIX.

It is to be assumed that the documents mentioned in this list are of paper unless they are stated to be of parchment or tracing cloth. The measurements are given horizontally by vertically.
